


FRUITS & NUTS

Fruit trees provide us with a ready supply of vitamins and minerals, create an appealing outdoor environment, and a sense of self-sufficiency, while offering delicious, nutritious food at the same time!

We have all become increasingly aware of the effects of pesticides, fungicides, and shelf-life extending chemicals found in, and on, our fresh fruits. There are two ways to avoid these chemicals: buy organically-grown fruit (which can be expensive and hard to find), or grow your own!

Surry Gardens has carefully selected the hardiest stock available. We have kept your needs in mind and our selections reflect a wide variety of uses ranging from canning to cooking, to eating fresh, while considering the aesthetic qualities and space requirements of each product. APPLE

Most apples are not self-fruiting. Plant **two varieties** of approximately the same blooming season in order to get good pollination: early with early to mid-season, late with mid to late season. Apples are pollinated by bees; they are not wind pollinated. Flowering branches from other apple trees that are blooming at the same time may be cut and placed in water beneath your trees so that bees will be attracted to both flower sources creating a cross-pollination. Provide full sun and very well-drained soil, enriched with plenty of peat moss and manure. Planting on a north or west facing slope helps minimize frost damage to buds in spring. Zone 4-7. Ask for our pollination sheet.
STANDARD: 20-25'H. Plant 20-80' apart. Fruit in 4-8 years.
SEMI-DWARF: 15-20'H. Plant 20-80' apart. Fruit in 4-6 years.
DWARF: 10-15'H. Plant 15-80' apart. Fruit in 3-4 years.
BLOOM TIME: E=Early M=Mid L=Late

- '**Cortland**', Dwarf, Semi-Dwarf. (M). Medium sized, striped dark red skin. Eating and cooking. White flesh of fruit does not brown rapidly. Good keeper. Tree has a wide shape. Annual bearer of heavy crops. Zone 4.
- '**Honeycrisp**', Semi-dwarf. (M). Explosive crispness, flavor, and texture. Orange red on a yellow background. Very hardy, from Minnesota. Good keeper. Zone 4.
- '**Kindercrisp**', Semi-dwarf. (E). Flowers early. Fruit ripens in late August with a flavorful crisp texture. Zone 4.

- '**LaCrescent**', Standard. (E). Fruits are striped red over yellow with a slight blush. Crisp and Juicy. Zone 4.

- '**Macoun**', Dwarf. (M). Medium sized, dark purple-red skin. Firm with crisp texture and white flesh. Well-balanced flavor. Good for eating. Zone 4.

- '**McIntosh**', Dwarf. (M). Discovered 200 years ago by John McIntosh. Large apples with bright red skin. Heavy bearer. Long-time eating and cooking favorite. Zone 4.
- '**Royal Gala**', Dwarf. (E). Aromatic descendant of Cox's Orange Pippin. Number one choice for an early, medium-sized dessert apple. Strong, compact tree. **7 gal. \$54.95**
- '**Winesap**', Dwarf. (L). Red, sweet with tangy finish. Excellent keeper. For eating, cooking or cider.
- '**Zestar**', Semi-dwarf, Standard. (E). An early apple that is crisp and juicy, with sweet tart flavor. Excellent for fresh eating and cooking.

-'ESPALIER APPLES'

Espaliering is the training of a tree into a one dimensional flattened growth pattern. It is fun and easy to maintain for the gardener. Plant against a south wall, fence, or trellis.

APRICOT

Highly ornamental. Earliest spring blossoms of all fruit trees. Elegant, vase-shaped trees with heart-shaped leaves and rust colored bark. European apricots have been bred for the flavorful fruit which is sold fresh, however, they are less hardy than Asian apricots. Humus-rich, very well-drained soil. **NO CLAY**. 3-4 years to bearing. As buds may be damaged by frost, it is critical that your apricot be planted with an exposure which does not allow the morning sun to thaw out frozen flower buds too quickly. Most are self fruitful; however, **plant two varieties** in our area for better crops. Full sun. Zone 4-8. 12-15'H.

- '**Sungold**', Standard. Bright, clear gold, 1¼" fruit hangs on tree until ripe. Mild, sweet flavor. Excellent quality. Ripens in August. *Freestone*. Self pollinating, plant with another variety for better crops. **7 gal. \$54.95**

ASPARAGUS

*No, it's not a fruit...*in fact this is the most permanent of all vegetable crops, lasting 15-20 years or more. Full sun and well-drained, very rich, sandy, moist soil. Dig a trench 12" deep and line it with a mixture of aged manure, compost, and soil. Set the crowns 12" apart and 8" deep. Cover with 2" of enriched soil and firm lightly over the roots. As the young shoots appear, add more soil. Repeat as shoots lengthen, until the trench is filled. Harvest lightly the following spring, then as desired. - '**Jersey Knight**'. Extra-large spears that are extremely tender and tasty. Spear tips stay tight. Highly disease resistant. Vigorous. Zone 3-7.
- '**Jersey Supreme**'. Matures early. Produces medium to medium-large spears. High yields of green spears with slightly purple bracts. Zone 4.
- '**Purple Passion**'. Milder flavored, sweet, tender, stringless spears. When cooked, the bright purple color is reduced, but when served fresh in salads, it provides a colorful and flavorful accent. For best performance and productive yields, space plants 6-8" apart in rows instead of the usual 12" spacing. Zone 3-8.

BLUEBERRY

MAINE Native. Plant at least TWO VARIETIES for best pollination. Blueberries want full sun, and moist, well-drained, humus-rich, acid soil. Check pH annually. Prune after fruiting. Delicious right off the bush and in pies, muffins, and on ice cream! High ornamental value for the shrub border, foundation. Many have brilliant red fall foliage.

Key: E=Early crop, M=Mid-season, L=Late crop
(Yield: Pounds per year per bush)

Highbush Blueberry

(*Vaccinium corymbosum*)

- '**Berkeley**'. **M.** Large, pale blue fruit in loose clusters. Less acid than most. Use for pies or eating fresh. Stores well without cracking. Yellow-orange fall color. Vigorous, spreading, and productive. Zone 5. 5-6'H. (5 lbs.)
- '**Bluecrop**'. **M.** Exceptionally productive! Medium large, firm, bright blue, slightly tart berries begin to ripen in mid-July. Red fall color. Vigorous. Prune to maintain fruit size. Zone 4. 4-6'H. (10-20 lbs.)

- '**Bluegold**'. **M.** Extremely productive. Sky-blue, firm, flavorful, evenly sized fruit. Compact, spreading form. Zone 4. To 4'H. (10-12lbs.)
- '**Bluejay**'. **M.** Large tight clusters of medium-large berries. Pleasant flavor. Crack resistant. Yellow-orange fall foliage. Vigorous. Zone 4. 5-7'H. (10-20 lbs.)
- '**Blueray**'. **M.** Firm, large, powder-blue, sweet fruit. Excellent flavor. Rosy-pink flowers in full bloom turn white. Burgundy leaves in fall. Vigorous. Zone 4. 4-6'H. (10-20 lbs.)
- '**Chandler**'. **L.** Huge, ultra-sweet, high quality, dark blue fruits are up to 1" in diameter. They ripen over 4-6 weeks. Slight spreading form. Zone 5. 5-6'H x 3-4'W. (7-10 lbs.)
- '**Chippewa**'. **M.** Large, dark blue fruit is sweet and slightly tart. Glossy, dark green foliage turns bright red in autumn. Dense, upright habit. Zone 3. (4-6 lbs.)
- '**Collins**'. **E.** Delicious, very sweet, light blue berries. Red and yellow fall foliage. Dense, slightly spreading form. Zone 3. 4-6'H. (4-6 lbs.)
- '**Darrow**'. **L.** Largest fruit of any cultivar. Powder-blue fruit has a robust, slightly tart flavor. Vigorous. Upright form. Zone 4. 5-6'H. (8-10 lbs.)
- '**Duke**'. **E.** Medium to large, light blue berries. Mildly sweet. Blooms late, protecting flower buds from frost, but ripens early. Yellow-orange fall color. Zone 5. 4-6'H (15-20 lbs.)
- '**Elliott**'. **VL.** Medium-sized, light blue berries ripen in late August. The last berries to ripen. Deep wine-red foliage in fall. Bountiful crops. Zone 4. 5-7'H (10-20 lbs.)
- '**Friendship**'. **M.** Berries comparable to wild blueberries and huckleberries. Excellent ornamental value with glossy summer foliage and brilliant fall color. University of Wisconsin introduction. Vigorous. 24"H. (4-8 lbs.)
- '**Herbert**'. **M.** Large, 7/8" berries ripen in mid-July. Striking red foliage in the fall and interesting red branches throughout the winter season. Zone 4. 5-8'H (5-8 lbs.)
- '**Jersey**'. **L.** Large, flavorful, dark blue berries. Reliable producer. Excellent ornamental value. Zone 4. 5-7'H (4-8 lbs.)
- '**Late Blue**'. **VL.** Medium to large, dark blue berries. Good flavor. Upright form. Vigorous. Zone 5. 4-6'H (4-6 lbs.)
- '**Nelson**'. **L.** Large, firm, very good quality, dark blue fruit. Outstanding fresh berries. Zone 3. 5-6'H (12-16 lbs.)
- '**Patriot**'. **E.** From the University of Maine. Large, dark blue, rich-flavored fruit. Fiery-orange fall color. Performs well, even in heavy soil. Zone 3. 4-6'H (10-12 lbs.)

- '**Reka**'. **E.** Large crops of dark blue, flavorful berries. More tolerant of wet, heavier soil. Zone 4. 4-6'H (15-20 lbs.)

-'Rubel'. **LM.** A wild, high bush blueberry discovered in the 1900's. The small, dark berries have the highest anti-oxident level of any blueberry. The small, sweet-tart berry is perfect for pies, muffins and pancakes. Foliage turns bright fire-red in fall. Hardy to Zone 3. 4-6'H.

-'Sierra'. **EM.** Large, light blue, sweet berries borne in loose clusters. Very firm. 4-6'H

-'Spartan'. **E.** Large, light blue berries with a delicious, tangy, sweet flavor. Orange to yellow fall foliage. Zone 4. 5-6'H (6-8 lbs).

-'Sweetheart'. **E.** Heavy crops of sweet, juicy fruit. First crop ripens late May to early June. Second crop ripens in August. Self pollinating. 4-6'H (15 lbs).

-'Toro'. **M.** Full, heavy clusters of giant, sky-blue fruit. Bronze foliage in spring, deep green in summer and brightest of reds in fall. Slow grower. Stocky form. Zone 4. 4-6'H. (10-20 lbs).

Highbush/Lowbush Blueberry

(Hybrids between lowbush and highbush blueberry)

-'North Blue'. **E.** Attractive, large, dark blue fruit. Firm fruit stores well. Glossy, dark green foliage turns red in fall. Compact. Vigorous. Zone 3. 2-3'H x 3-4'W (4-8 lbs).

-'North Country'. **E.** Medium sized, sky-blue berries have a mild, sweet flavor. Fiery-red fall foliage. Vigorous. Outstanding landscape variety. Zone 3. 1½-2'H x 3½'W (3-5lbs).

-'North Sky'. **M.** Small, sky-blue berries have a wild-blueberry taste. Ripening late July. Excellent landscape plant. Glossy green leaves turn dark red in fall. Compact. Hardy to -45°F! Zone 2. 12-18"H x 24-30"W (1-3 lbs).

-'Northland'. **E.** Small, dark blue, wild blueberry flavored fruit. Heavy producer. Excellent for jams and baking. Attractive fall foliage. Moderately spreading habit. Zone 3. 4'H x 4'W. (15-20 lbs).

-'Sunshine Blue'. Pink flowers followed by deep blue fruit. Self-pollinating. Zone 5. 3-4' H. (3-7 lbs).

CHERRY

Magnificent in bloom. Highly valued as an ornamental. Prepare to share the harvest with the birds. The species name for the sweet cherry, (*Prunus avium*), means "for the birds". Sun. Moist, very rich, and definitely well-drained soil in a protected spot. Sour cherries are self-fruiting, while most SWEET CHERRIES REQUIRE ANOTHER VARIETY of sweet cherry for pollination. Great for pies, desserts, and eating out of hand. Only the hardiest varieties have been selected.

-'Bing'. **Standard. Sweet.** Dark red, sweet, firm, aromatic fruit. Top choice for flavor.

-'Black Tartarian'. **Semi-dwarf, Standard. Sweet.** Large, purplish-black fruit has firm, dark red, tender, juicy flesh. Good for fresh eating, canning and preserves. The best variety for pollinating dark, sweet cherries.

-'Kristin'. **Standard. Sweet.** Winter hardy variety tested in Norway. Fruit is glossy, purple-black, with a sweet, rich, aromatic flavor. Not a pollinator.

-'Lapin'. **Standard. Sweet.** Very large and sweet. Bing-type, dark purple fruit. Heavy producer. Crack resistant. **Self fertile.** Excellent pollinator. Zone 5. **10 gal.\$58.95**

-'Meteor'. **Standard. Sour.** Mid to late harvest of large, bright red, pie cherry with clear yellow flesh. Very hardy.

-'North Star'. **Standard. Sour.** Early, large, very flavorful, wine-red fruit with red flesh. For canning and pies. Attractively shaped tree. Fruit is crack and brown rot resistant. **Self Fertile.** Zone 4.

-'Rainier'. **Standard. Sweet.** Abundant crops ripen to sweet, richly flavored, firm, juicy, very large, golden yellow fruits with a red blush in early May. Needs pollinator (Bing, Lapin, Stella, Van). Zone 5.

-'Sweet Cherry Pie'. **Sour .** From Wisconsin orchardist Bill Eubank, this new sour pie cherry has a sweet taste although not for fresh eating. They are, however, fantastic for jams, jellies and pies. Blooms early May with dark red ripe fruit in mid-July. **Self fertile.** Zone 3. 15'H.

-ESPALIER CHERRY.

Espaliering is the training of a tree into a one dimensional flattened growth pattern. It is fun and easy to maintain for the gardener. Plant against a south wall, fence or trellis. These trees require the same pollination as other cherry trees with same name. In spring a fairyland of color with clouds of cherry blossoms followed by rich, juicy, sugar-sweet cherries.

-'4-N-1', **Semi-dwarf. Sweet.** Plants contain varieties from the following selections: Bing, Black Tartarian, Lapin, Montmorency, Stella, and Van.

CRANBERRY

-**Vaccinium macrocarpon.** (vak-SIN-ee-em). This type of cranberry is also known as "*Large Cranberry*" or "*American Cranberry*". Plants are usually found in swampy or boggy areas. This mat-forming plant has bell-shaped, pink flowers in spring which are followed by bright red berries in fall. The berries are tart and generally used in baking. Shiny green foliage turns brown in winter. Best in sandy soil and full sun. Zone 3. 6"H x 3'W.

-**'Ben Lear'**. Wild clone from Wisconsin. Large to medium, deep red fruit. Early ripening. Good production.

-**'Pilgrim'**. Bright red, oval shaped berries are tart with cream colored flesh. Great in breads, cakes, on cereal, or with other fresh fruit. This groundcover has a dense growth habit.

-**Vaccinium vitis idaea var. minus.** (*Mountain Cranberry*).

MAINE NATIVE. Nodding white or pink flowers in spring. Long lasting bright red, edible fruit. Good groundcover with dark green, glossy evergreen foliage which turns bronze in winter. Very accomodating plant. Vigorous. Prostrate shrub to 3-4"H.

GOUMI

(*Eleagnus multiflora*)

Goumi. A very pretty small shrub with *fragrant* creamy white flowers that bloom in May. Flowers are followed by beautiful and tasty, very early ripening red berries, about the size of a small cherry. Dark green foliage is sivery beneath. Foliage and fruit are covered with silver and gold flecks. Hardy to -25°F.

-**'Sweet Scarlet'**. Selected at the Main Botanic Garden in Kiev, Ukraine. Dark red juicy and aromatic fruit ripens end of June to beginning of July. Fruit has a unique sweet-tart flavor with hints of cherries, apples and black currants. Delicious fresh, dried or in pie or jam. Adapts well to any well drained site in at least a half day sun. Begins bearing at 2-3 years. Not bothered by pests or disease and requires little fertilizer. Zone 4-8. 6'H x 6'W.

GRAPE

Grapes are one of the world's oldest cultivated fruits. The Egyptians made wine as early as 3,000 B.C. Excellent for jellies, preserves, juice, and landscaping. The lush foliage lends a special distinction to the garden. Provide full sun and well-drained soil. Avoid planting your grapes in a frost pocket. The best locations are those which trap the sun's rays and block the wind. A mulch of well composted seaweed has been known to increase yield. Trellis or arbor needed. Benefits from yearly pruning. See our culture sheet for more detailed instruction. Even though these are **self-pollinating**, it is best to PLANT TWO VARIETIES for maximum fruit production.

-**'Bluebell'**. Resembles '*Concord*' in size and color. Tender blue skin. Superior fruity flavoe for juice, jam or jelly. Lighter juice than '*Concord*'. Ripens early to mid-September. Zone 4.

-**'Canadace Seedless'**. Early, large red fruit. Compact clusters. For eating fresh. Zone 5.

-**'Concord Seedless'**. Grapes and clusters are generally smaller than '*Concord*'. Excellent in pies, jams and jellies. Zone 5.

-**'Edelweiss'**. Early. Green-white with high sugar content. Disease and fungus resistant. Dessert and wine grape. Zone 4.

-**'Glenora'**. Bears abundant clusters of juicy, blue-black, richly flavored, **seedless** grapes. Ripens in mid-August. Attractive, vigorous and disease resistant. Zone 5.

-**'Reliance Seedless'**. Thin skinned, deep red color with excellent rich flavor. Ripens in late August. Disease resistant.

-**'Somerset Seedless'**. Clusters of small deep red berries for table and juice. Berries are edible at pink stage but are much sweeter and more flavorful if left to ripen to full red August to early September. Quite disease resistant but is susceptible to downy mildew if left unsprayed. Zone 4.

HONEYBERRY

Native to Eastern Siberia, the Russian Far East and Japan. This attractive small shrub is a highly valued fruiting plant in its native ranges. A member of the Honeysuckle family, it produces tasty berries about the size, flavor and color of wild blueberries with a higher level of antioxidants. Hardy to Zone 3, this plant is very easy to grow having neither pest nor disease problems. Prune late winter or early spring. Bears best in sun. 50+ year lifespan. Early blooming cultivars bear prior to strawberries and late bloomers a few weeks later. Two varieties of similar bloom period are needed for pollination.

EARLY BLOOMING CULTIVARS

-**Berry Blue**'. Upright shrub with abundant crops of large, dark blue berries early summer. Hardy and drought tolerant. Use as a pollinator for Tundra and Borealis. 4'H x 3'W.

-**Blue Belle**'. A compact and spreading shrub, Blue Belle bears good crops of large, deep blue tasty fruit. 4-5'H x 4-5'W.

-**Blue Bird**'. This Russian variety forms an upright bush and bears large crops of tasty, dark blue berries. 5-6'H.

-**Borealis**'. Blue fruits excellent for fresh eating or cooking. 4'H x 4'W.

-**Tundra**'. A smaller bush but larger fruit that taste like wild blueberries with a hint of black currant. Zone 2. 4-5'H x 4-5'W

LATE BLOOMING CULTIVARS

-**Blue Forest**'. Large, dark blue tasty fruit for fresh eating or for delicious preserves. Spreading form. Zone 3-8. 3'H x 3'W.

-**Blue Hokkaido**'. Popular in Japan, this variety features attractive, upright form and large, very tasty, sweet-tart berries. 4-5'H. 3'H x 3'W.

HORSERADISH

Use pungent, fleshy roots ground up in sauces and relishes. Grow in full sun. Water freely when growing to prevent roots from becoming woody. Fertile, well-drained soil. Ask for culture sheet.

KIWI

Actinidia. (*ak-tin-ID-ia*). These aren't the fuzzy, egg-shaped fruits you'll find at the supermarket, but their extremely hardy sisters. The fruits are smaller and often sweeter. The taste has been described as ..."fuzzy kiwi, banana, strawberry, and pear flavors." Kiwi fruit is a rich source of Vitamin C, potassium, and Vitamins A and E.

Hardy Kiwis are **EASY** to grow! Vines can be trained to the side of a building, along a fence, up into trees, or on a trellis; they climb by twining. A location protected from strong winds is best. Flowers develop on last year's growth. Most varieties **REQUIRE BOTH MALE AND FEMALE PLANTS** for fruit. Full sun. Ask for our culture sheet. If you don't want fruit, buy only one plant and take advantage of this vigorous vine which is **EXCELLENT FOR TRELLISES**.

-**arguta.** (*Hardy Kiwi*). Vigorous, disease and pest-free vines. The 1½" long by 1" diameter, dark green berries, ripen in September. The fruit will keep up to a month, or more, under refrigeration. Most varieties bear fruit (up to 150 lbs.) 3-4 years after planting. *Fragrant* flowers develop in May and June. Male *arguta* kiwis will pollinate any female *arguta*. Requires support. Hardy to (-25°F). Grow to 30'H or more.

-**Anna**', **Female.** (*syn. 'Ananasnaja'*). Large, very sweet, delicious, almost minty-tasting, fruit (to ½ oz). Abundant fruit production, used commercially. Vigorous.

-**Hardy Male**'. Vigorous, pest free vine. *Fragrant* white flowers in clusters of 3 in early summer. Pollinator.

-**Hardy Red**'. **Female.** Attractive, sweet-tart, cranberry-red fruit with red flesh.

-**Michigan State**', **Female.** Bears extremely large, sweet, flavorful, lime-green fruit.

-**Rossana**', **Female.** A new Italian variety which bears good crops of large, attractive, red-blushed, delicious fruit.

-**kolomikta 'Arctic Beauty'**, **Male.** A deciduous twining vine with purple foliage at a young age. Particularly striking with its pink and white 5" variegated leaves. Zone 4-8. 15-20'H.

-**polygama 'Pavel'**, **Male.** Selected for its attractive foliage and profuse flowers. Pavel can pollinate up to 8 females and does not bear fruit.

LINGONBERRY

A relative of the blueberry. The nutritious red fruit is used in preserves, fruit dishes, and pastries. Plentiful white flowers and shiny green leaves make these beautiful ornamentals as well. Stoloniferous. All are disease resistant. As with most fruits, better yields are obtained if two different varieties are planted. Sun. Acidic, moist, well-drained soil.

-**Erntesege**n'. Origin Germany. Deep red, large fruits have good acidity but sweetness is pronounced as well. High crop yields. Vigorous, very productive spreading quickly. 12"H.

NEW-'Little Red'. Origin Swedish University. Fruits deep red and of medium size, ripen in October but will stay attached to plants for a long period to ripen to full flavor. A vigorous plant with good resistance to diseases. 12-15"H.

NEW-'Magenta'. Origin Swedish University. Flowering occurs early with high yields of deep red, large fruit. Plants are highly vigorous and are resistant to root diseases. 12-15"H.

Mulch with straw and aged manure. Thinning and pruning increase production. Plant 2½-3' apart. Train the canes on a 2 or 3 wire trellis.

STRAWBERRY

Immediately after planting, water them in well by applying 1-2 cups of a starter fertilizer solution per plant. A starter fertilizer solution can be prepared by adding 2-3 tablespoons of a complete water-soluble fertilizer, such as, 5-10-5 or 10-10-10 to a gallon of water. Zone 3-10.
